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# **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

2020 was the Centre's first year as a centrally funded, priority research area at UC, meaning significant changes in the Centre's operations and the ways in which it reports its successes and achievements relative to University-established Key Performance Indicators. Winning this recognition and support for the work of the Centre was not only an enormous achievement for our distinctive group of multi and interdisciplinary researchers and creative practitioners, but also a test of their resilience and creativity over this difficult 12 months. Of course, we entered the year with grand plans for many events, activities and staff recruitment – all of which were impacted in some way by the unfortunate series of events that was 2020 fire, hail and pandemic combined. However, the CCCR team rose to this challenge - supporting isolated colleagues and PhD researchers, pivoting events and research to online, acquiring new skills, and balancing ever-increasing workloads with remote-learning support for families and a host of other unanticipated demands. It is also incredible to report that despite these exigencies, members managed to outperform all past productivity metrics that the University applies to Research Centres: to apply for more than \$10 million in external research funding – with a 45% success rate - run an online poetry festival and exhibition, publish books and articles with leading international publishers – and so much more.

I want to record my admiration and respect for all my colleagues and thank them for their hard work, commitment and tenacity. The CCCR's projects are driven by an ethical and values-based commitment to contributing to community wellbeing and transformative social justice outcomes. In this vein, a significant new project commenced in 2020 was ReGeneration. Developed by the CCCR, the Hospital Research Foundation and Phoenix Australia to help build resilience in

communities affected by the 2020 bushfires, this project is funded and driven by Magda Szubanski and Will Connelly using funds raised by them in the aftermath of the 2019/20 Black Summer. This project exemplifies the growing recognition of the power of art and creative expression to contribute to healing, truth telling and enabling diverse communities to tell their own stories and build towards recovery.

The additional strategic funds invested in the CCCR enabled the appointment of a new Research Fellow, Dr Ursula Frederick, who commenced in July 2020, completing an ARC DECRA Fellowship in December 2020. A notable and landmark publication in 2020 was Paul Hetherington's co-authored, *Prose Poetry: An Introduction* published by Princeton University Press, while across the board CCCR members exceeded all past publication performance with over 70% of articles being placed in top ranking Q1 journals, and with 25% featuring international co-authors. These achievements demonstrate the hard work of members in the years leading up to 2020, and this was so important in setting the centre on a solid footing for the difficult year. But in 2020 itself members brought in more than \$1 million in external research funding for that year alone, also winning new, ongoing projects which mean that we enter 2021 with an exciting and rich program of funded projects, creating opportunities to employ further research-focussed fellows and postdoctoral scholars, recruit new PhD candidates and interact with diverse communities and research networks locally, nationally and internationally.

I would like to record the CCCR's thanks to the DVCR&I. Professor Leigh Sullivan and Executive Dean, Faculty of Arts and Design, Professor Jason Bainbridge, for their support of the CCCR's work and our aspirational plans to develop and grow. Finally, I want to acknowledge the work of Katie Havne (right), the CCCR's Research Development Officer, and thank her for supporting all the work of the Centre and holding us all together in tumultuous times. These achievements would not have been possible without her expert and judicious management of numerous budgetary and reporting processes as well as her support of our research project teams, HDRs and all CCCR members.

# **ABOUT THE CCCR**

The Centre for Creative and Cultural Research is a hub for applied creative practice and interdisciplinary research that intersects with new approaches in the health, environmental, digital and citizen humanities. Our researchers conduct imaginative and practical experiments that contribute to building wellbeing, sustainability and resilience for diverse communities and their valued cultures, heritage, places and environments

A central feature of our research concerns how **innovative humanities methods** and creative practice can further our understanding of contemporary local and global challenges—including climate change, experienced and inherited trauma, and urban, environmental and economic disruption and transformation.

Our researchers build **collaborative**, **multidisciplinary teams** involving community members, scientists, health professionals, and industry partners, to tackle these issues at the local level and to help re-imagine shared futures.

As well as leading interdisciplinary researchers, many of the Centre's members are also creative practitioners who produce not only traditional scholarly outputs, but also art, poetry, creative writing, activations, exhibitions, and professional inputs for government, cultural and community institutions. The Centre was launched in March 2013 and is located within the Faculty of Arts and Design.

# **OUR RESEARCH PROGRAMS**

# ARTS-HEALTH

Arts-Health focuses on the ways in which creative practice can contribute to enhancing wellbeing and to recovery from exposure to traumatic experience. Researchers employ a health humanities approach to engage with individuals, communities and health professionals.

# INTERNATIONAL POETRY STUDIES

International Poetry Studies conducts research related to poetry and publishes and promulgates the outcomes of this research internationally. International Poetry Studies aims to develop new communities of poetry and to make new links between poets wherever they are. It aims to celebrate the complexity and variety of poetry and, while doing so, to bring poetry to the attention of as wide an audience as possible.

#### **FUTURE HERITAGE**

The Future Heritage program recognises heritage as a rapidly evolving field of contemporary cultural practices. It focuses on research that maps and describes changing forms of practice and participation, and on practical collaborations with cultural institutions and communities that conserve and enliven tangible and intangible heritage and build new forms of heritage.

# STORY, PEOPLE, PLACE

Story, People, Place focuses on creative responses to the diverse challenges facing individuals, communities and the environment. Researchers engage with these challenges through creative practice that generates sustainable responses. Projects focus on: play and creativity; interventions for sustainable futures and Indigenous narrative and inclusion.

# HERITAGE OF THE AIR: HOW AVIATION TRANSFORMED AUSTRALIA

Heritage of the Air is a three-year Australian Research Council Linkage project that investigates how aviation has transformed Australian society over the last 100 years. In the lead up to Australia's centenary of civil aviation, its focus is on people rather than planes and it seeks to tell the broader story of diverse Australian communities and aviation. The project aims to engage with the public's enduring fascination with aviation through innovative analyses and interpretation of little-known aviation heritage collections, to produce exciting exhibitions, accessible digital collections and heritage resources, as well as scholarly publications. While progress for this project was significantly impeded in 2020 due to museum and archive closures, lock down and travel bans, the team refocussed work on digital collections and supported its six related PhD researchers to maintain progress with their projects.

# LASER CLEANING PROCESSES FOR ROADS AND MARITIME SERVICES BRIDGES

Australian Research Council Linkage Project, LP180100276, 2019–2021 Total: \$858,997, UC: \$122,006

Partners: Australia's Nuclear Science and Technology Association (ANTSO) and Roads and Maritime Services (now Transport for NSW)

UC's role in this project is to evaluate the condition of the granite cladding on the pylons and piers of Sydney Harbour Bridge, and investigate the potential for using ultrashort pulse lasers to remove dirt and staining from the stone. Access to the Bridge

has been limited by COVID restrictions, so initial work has studied the effect of ultrashort pulse lasers on samples of the granite drawn from the original Moruya quarry. This has established the safe laser energy levels for cleaning each of the several minerals in the stone.

# HOME ECONOMIX: A LAB FOR DECENTRALISING PUBLIC AND COMMUNITY ART THROUGH DOMESTIC SPACES

Home Economix is a decentralised digital arts lab that conducts experiments in new forms of public/community engaged art in physically distanced contexts. With a focus on developing mixed-reality techniques, this application is for funding to develop a small mixed-reality art-kits for remote collaboration and exhibition, alongside fees for lab mentors and artists. Research questions include: How can public and community- based art be translated inclusively into the remote and digital setting? What on-going benefits could this furnish for regional/rural communities as well as people living with disability? How does the increasing visibility of domestic life, impact the public/private art distinction?

The interdisciplinary 'Before Cook' project commenced in November 2020. Working collaboratively with Tiwi Island Traditional Owners, the project focuses on the past 400 year-period after contact with Southeast Asian mariners and Europeans. Over the next twelve months, CI Mirani Litster (UC), will be working with CI Rachel Popelka-Filcoff (University of Melbourne) and PI Wonu Veys (Museum Volkenkunde), to identify wooden objects from the Tiwi Islands now kept in Dutch collecting institutions and exploring potential avenues for their digital repatriation.

#### ARCHIVES IN BARK: CARVED AND INSCRIBED KIMBERLEY BOAB TREES

Australian Research Council Discovery Project, 2020–2023

Total: \$283,679, UC: \$16,107

This project seeks to record and contextualise Indigenous and non-Indigenous carvings and inscriptions on ancient Australian boab trees (Adansonia gregorii) growing in the Kimberley region of Western Australia. It will document a hitherto poorly recorded form of traditional Indigenous cultural and artistic practice, as well as information about the lives of Indigenous and non-Indigenous people living on missions and pastoral properties prior to and immediately following European contact. The significance of the project lies in its ability to record information about the lives of people not captured in other types of historical documents. The project also anticipates providing ecological information about the condition of these Kimberley heritage trees.

## THE SUSTAINABLE SHINE DOME

The University of Canberra has partnered with the Australian Academy of Science, GML Heritage and GHD Engineering to develop an innovative sustainability plan

for a net-zero emissions future for the National Heritage listed place, the Shine Dome. The multidisciplinary research team is investigating innovative approaches to ensure progressive energy and emissions reductions and adoption of a range of sustainability measures that will contribute to the ongoing protection and promotion of the Shine Dome's unique national heritage values.

# **CATEGORY 2 FUNDING**

# ARTS FOR RECOVERY, RESILIENCE, TEAMWORK AND SKILLS (ARRTS)

Department of Defence, 2015–2021, \$1,571,000 (\$156,800 in 2020)

Since 2015 a research team within the CCCR and FAD have been contracted by the Department of Defence to mentor serving military personnel with illness or injury. We work with defence and emergency services personnel to assist them in building skills in creative writing and in visual arts as a way of telling their stories. The Defence ARRTS participants produce a public performance and exhibition night which is the culmination of their four-week program. This is attended by their families and by a wide range of local and national dignitaries ranging from the Assistant Minister for Defence, to the chiefs of the various Services, and local and national politicians. The project, which is residential and intensive, runs twice annually, in May and November. Evaluations so far have shown significant psychological and psychosocial benefits from engaging in the four-week program.

During 2020, the covid lockdown had a significant impact upon our ability to deliver the project, because the first iteration coincided with the first national lockdown period, during May and June, and thus had to be cancelled. Fortunately, by November the situation had improved to the point where we were able to run the program more or less normally, with social distancing protocols in place and a livestreaming element added for family and friends unable to attend the showcase.

We also submitted a tender to the Department of Defence in 2020 for the continued delivery of the program in 2021 and 2022, with an option to extend to 2023, which was successful.

# **REGENERATION (BUSHFIRE RECOVERY)**

ReGeneration is a project run by the CCCR, The Hospital Research Foundation (THRF) and Phoenix Australia to help build resilience in communities affected by the 2020 bushfires. It is funded through money raised by Magda Szubanski and Will Connelly and builds on our extensive experience in delivering trauma informed

creative practice workshops to the Australian Defence Force through the ARRTS program. Unlike Defence ARRTS, Regeneration has a focus upon building capacity for the delivery of Trauma Informed Arts and Practice Workshops and programs within bushfire impacted communities, rather than upon the direct delivery of these programs. It works with community artists and arts organisations, to supply and deliver mentoring and resources, including Trauma Informed Care (TIC) training provided by the Phoenix foundation, to assist and encourage local artists and creative practitioners to work with and within their communities in a safe and supportive way.

In 2020 the project teams developed a series of artist engagement workshops to be run in 2021. These will be run in Snowy Valley (Tumut, Tumbarumba and Batlow), Kangaroo Island, and the Victorian Alps. Following on from these, the community artists involved will deliver their own workshops within their own communities. These will be evaluated in both qualitative and quantitative modes by members of the Regeneration team.

# HAIG PARK ACTIVATIONS MANAGER 2020 (HAIG PARK EXPERIMENTS)

Canberra Renewal Authority, ACT Government, 2020, \$100,000

Haig Park Activations continued into 2020 with the design of a program of activations that assisted the community to safely return to the park through gradual escalation in program scale in response to changing COVID-19 public health emergency protocols. From June to December we delivered 34 COVID-safe events in the park targeting diverse groups (see: Events).

# **CATEGORY 3 FUNDING**

## GINNINDERRY LIVING LAB: GREEN, OPEN AND PLAY SPACE

Riverview Projects, 2020-2022 \$31,900

The aim of this project is to co-develop with stakeholders and community a Phase 1 suite of open, green and play spaces that are diverse, unique, sustainable, accessible and that encourage optimal physical, recreational and social activity and



play across a person's lifespan. In 2020, we identified with the community the role and potential of 'The Link' play space and produced a report with recommendations for this space. We also undertook an audit of the new Neighbourhood Play Space 1 to inform a 2021 intervention, and an interdisciplinary Professional Practice student team collaborated with Ginninderry staff and play space designers to produce a unique play element for Neighbourhood Play Space 2.

## **ECONOMYTHOLOGIES - MONEYLAB#X**

Western Sydney University, \$5,000

Chief Investigator: **Dr Denise THWAITES** (UC)

In a time of eco-crises, techno-uto/dystopias, disaster capitalism and necropolitics, communities the world over are compelled to examine the economic systems and narratives that have driven them towards cataclysm. MoneyLab #X Economythologies critically explores the working and un-working of myths that have/do/will shape our economic realities. Embracing the non-linearity of time and the multiplicity of actants that construct our economythologies, the program seeks to widen the aperture of our future.

This project was launched with a two-day event and exhibitions, taking place across Ainslie+Gorman Arts Centre (Canberra) and Bett Gallery (Hobart) on 5–6 November. The videos from these livestreamed sessions can now be found online.

# **EVALUATION OF 'EASY P' VOLUNTEER DRIVING PROGRAM**

Belconnen Community Service, \$5,000

Chief Investigator: Associate Professor Bethaney TURNER (UC)

This project was designed to evaluate the impacts of a volunteer-run program that supported young people in obtaining their driving license. The focus was on identifying existing barriers that prevented participants from getting their license and assessment of the benefits of driver-mentoring programs for both mentors and mentees. The research methodology was significantly impacted by COVID-19.

# WEST BELCONNEN COMMUNITY GARDENS TRANSITIONS PROJECT PHASE 2

Belconnen Community Service, \$6,000

Transition to high school can be a challenging time. This project explored the impacts of a garden-based mentoring project on the health and wellbeing of mentors and mentees.

# MIND THE GAP: ALIGNING LEGISLATION, VALUES AND RISK MANAGEMENT FOR THE PRESERVATION OF UTILITARIAN HERITAGE


Chief Investigator: **Dr Alison WAIN** (UC)

Australia's utilitarian (industrial and engineering) heritage is a significant resource. Keeping it operating maintains community engagement and preserves intangible heritage aspects of skill, culture and affective experience, but requires a creative, collaborative approach to maintaining safety without destroying heritage values. Differing disciplinary contexts and a challenging legal environment, however, make this difficult. Bringing together heritage specialists, lawyers and engineers this project is working with industry partners to investigate their understandings of value and risk, and will identify spheres of influence in the evolving legal and regulatory environment that heritage practitioners can use to promote the needs of operating utilitarian heritage.

# INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATIONS AND RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

# NEW BOOKS RAISING OUR UNDERSTANDING OF PROSE POETRY

Paul Hetherington and Cassandra Atherton published Prose Poetry: An Introduction in October with Princeton University Press. The first of its kind book provides an engaging and authoritative introduction to the history, development, and features of English-language prose poetry, an increasingly important and popular literary form that is still too little understood and appreciated. Cassandra and Paul introduce prose poetry's key characteristics, chart its evolution from the nineteenth century to the present, and discuss many historical and contemporary prose poems that both demonstrate their



great diversity around the Anglophone world and show why they represent some of today's most inventive writing.

Cassandra and Paul also published *The Anthology of Australian Prose Poetry* in September with Melbourne University Press. This national anthology recognises that prose poetry is a resurgent literary form in the English-speaking world and has been rapidly gaining popularity in Australia. Cassandra and Paul have gathered a broad and representative selection of the best Australian prose poems written over the last fifty years. The book includes numerous distinguished prose poets; Jordie Albiston, joanne burns, Gary Catalano, Anna Couani, Alex Skovron, Samuel Wagan Watson, Ania Walwicz and many more; and documents prose poetry's growing appeal over recent decades, from the poetic margins to the mainstream.

#### **BRITISH LIBRARY LABS RESEARCH AWARD**

With funding from the International Internet Preservation Consortium, Tim Sherratt worked with the British Library, the National Library of Australia, and the National Library of New Zealand to develop a new section of the GLAM Workbench designed to help researchers make use of web archives: https://glam-workbench.net/web-archives/.

In December, the new 'Web Archives' section of the GLAM Workbench won the British Library Labs Research Award for 2020, with the judges noting 'we genuinely think Tim's work has been at the forefront of computational hacking work in GLAMs'. # JOINT GRANT APPLICATION TO FUNDAÇÃO PARA A CIÊNCIA E A TECNOLOGIA WITH THE NOVA LISBON UNIVERSITY, PORTUGAL

Alison Wain represented UC in a joint grant application to Fundação para a Ciência e a Tecnologia with the Nova Lisbon University, Portugal. The team recently undertook the characterisation of materials in heritage machinery (metals, glass, coatings, lubricants) using analytical techniques suitable for the study of individual components. The IH2Move: Characterisation and condition monitoring of operational Industrial Heritage project will take the next step, characterising the condition and behaviour of operating heritage mechanical systems, with particular interest in modern monitoring techniques. The IH2Move project will use as a case study operational machinery from the Vale de Milhaços Gunpowder Factory in Seixal, Portugal.

#### MOU WITH UNIVERSIDADE DA CORUÑA IN SPAIN

Alison Wain has established an MOU with Universidade da Coruña in Spain to exchange information and to collaborate on the development of femtosecond laser cleaning techniques for heritage stonework, particularly granite.

## SUDDENNESS AND THE COMPOSITION OF POETIC THOUGHT

Paul Magee's book Suddenness and the Composition of Poetic Thought was contracted by Rowman and Littlefield International in October, and will be published in London and New York in December, 2021. The book takes the inherently improvisatory and nascently rhythmic qualities of everyday speaking as its way into the question of where poetry comes from, whether in first draft or revision. Suddenness and the Composition of Poetic Thought synthesises large bodies

of research in cognitive science, linguistics, literary studies and philosophy, as well as drawing closely on 30 research interviews (funded by both UC and the ARC) with major Anglophone poets.

#### **EMERITUS PROFESSOR SATENDRA NANDAN**

Satendra Nandan was invited to become an international consultant to the Ameena Gafoor Institute, London, by the Director, Professor David Dabydeen, Warwick University, England. Satendra's new book *Life Journeys: Love & Grief* is due for publication in 2021 with a Foreword by Professor Will Christie, Head, Humanities Research Centre, ANU. Satendra is currently researching a book on Mahatma Gandhi for Australasian readers through a grant from Charles Sturt University.

#### **BIG STUFF WEBSITE**

The *Big Stuff* website run by Alison Wain has been redeveloped to improve its ability to draw together academics and industry practitioners, volunteers and private owners to share information about the conservation, restoration, interpretation and adaptive re-use of industrial and large technology heritage. As well as providing an international online forum for the dissemination of research in this area, the website provides access to practitioner communities for future involvement in research both nationally and internationally. # **EVENTS**

# POETRY ON THE MOVE FESTIVAL

The 2020 Poetry on the Move festival was delivered entirely online due to COVID restrictions. It included a number of elements, including three eminent poets-in-residence: Vahni Capildeo (a Trinidadian Scottish writer of non-fiction and poetry whose work includes seven books and several pamphlets), Yeow Kai Chai (a poet, fiction writer, and editor from Singapore who has two poetry collections, *Pretend I'm Not Here* and *Secret Manta*); and Lisa Brockwell (runner-up in the University of Canberra Vice-Chancellor's International Poetry Prize in 2015 and highly commended in the Bridport Prize in the UK. Her book, *Earth Girls*, was published by Pitt Street Poetry). The poets-in-residence produced Poetry on the Move's 'Dispatches'—monthly columns and readings on a variety of fascinating topics.

Poetry on the Move also included 'Well-Known Corners' (in which a group of international and Australian poets responded to the concept of 'home'); 'Reader Submissions' (in which numerous poets submitted work in response to the well-known corners theme); and 'Planet Poetry', featuring video readings from eminent poets all around the world. Workshops were conducted by Owen Bullock ('The Haiku Journey'); Subhash Jaireth ('Translation: The Songs of Meerabai'); Lucy Alexander ('The Luminous Familiar: Poetry Transforming the Everyday'); and Melinda Smith ('Finding Poems in the Archive'). The festival's Meniscus Poetry Prize was won by Desmond Kon Zhicheng-Mingdé, with poems by Penelope Layland and Angela Costi commended by the judges.

The festival was initially directed by Shane Strange and then by Samuel Byrnand, both of whom did wonderful work, supported by an advisory committee



# HAIG PARK EXPERIMENTS

Haig Park Activations continued into 2020 with the design of a program of activations that assisted the community to safely return to the park through gradual escalation in program scale in response to changing COVID-19 public health emergency protocols. From June to December, we delivered 34 COVID-safe events in the park targeting diverse groups:

- Over 2,000 registered attendees at these events, and thousands of other visitors enjoying the park during events at a safe social distance.
- Over 6,500 people using the dog agility equipment (based on daily average), and tens of thousands of people using picnic tables and street furniture.
- Thousands of park users enjoying the revitalised Ngala signs, Tree Talk and Flight of the Fancies
- Two installations delivered (Tree Talk; Flight of the Fancies).
- Twenty wicking beds installed.
- Key Haig Park infrastructure repaired and/or upgraded

Women's Health Matters chief executive officer Marcia Williams said whereas once places such as Haig Park were commonly reported as a problem, they were now seeing design issues in some of the newer suburbs.

"In the intervening years there's been a lot done in Haig Park and you can see the results," she said.

"A few years ago almost 50 per cent of reports were from Haig Park. This year I don't think we've had any."

"If no one can observe you, there's always that fear there for women if they were to run into trouble."

# THE SUSTAINABLE SHINE DOME: ENVISIONING SUSTAINABLE HERITAGE FUTURES SYMPOSIUM

4 December 2020, The Shine Dome, Canberra

The University of Canberra has partnered with the Academy of Science, GML Heritage and GHD Engineering, to develop an innovative sustainability plan for a net-zero emissions future for the National Heritage Listed Canberra landmark, the Shine Dome. The multidisciplinary research team led by Michael Jasper, Professor of Architecture, and Tracy Ireland, Professor of Cultural Heritage, will investigate innovative approaches to ensure progressive energy and emissions reductions that contribute to the future protection and promotion of the Shine Dome's unique heritage values. As part of this project, there will be a series of Workshops



and Symposia that aim to build a conversation around heritage values and sustainability.

'Envisioning Sustainable Heritage Futures' was the first in a series of events to begin the conversation on sustainable heritage futures. Featuring local and international experts, including the Getty's Susan Macdonald and Dr Caroline Noller of the Footprint Company, the symposium introduced the Sustainable Shine Dome project, explored the Shine Dome's heritage values, and examined case studies of sustainability and heritage places.

# **DICKSON LIVING ROOMS**

12-20 November, Canberra

Dickson Living Rooms is a physical and digital heritage project that seeks to expose the lived-experiences of Dickson residents through the decades 1960s–2020s. The Dickson Living Rooms pavilion was erected next door to the Dickson Post Office from 15 November until 20 November, as part of Design Canberra. The project consisted of a temporary pavilion that hosted formal and informal events and an interactive online cultural map that featured custom imagery that afford novel search paths to fascinating archival information (news, real estate and interest stories) sourced from the National Library of Australia's digitised collection of *The Canberra Times* (available on Trove).

The project was delivered by a multidisciplinary team, led by Ben Ennis-Butler and Max Maxwell, consisting of academics and students from the Faculty of Arts and Design and was supported by a City Renewal Authority (CRA) Dickson Grant. See: https://dicksonlivingrooms.com/








# **HDR REPORT**

2020 posed many challenges for our HDR community. Many HDR projects were significantly altered due to restricted fieldwork capacity and access to resources. However, the HDR community remained active and vibrant throughout the year, even as many research spaces moved partially or entirely online. Prior to COVID disruptions, the CCCR hosted two HDR and ECR Bootcamps. These took place as two-day events, and were designed to help HDRs and early career researchers complete large amounts of writing in short periods of time, as well as providing friendly communal spaces to exchange ideas and discuss writing strategies. As lockdowns spread, these evolved into weekly Shut Up and Write sessions held via Zoom and open to all. These weekly writing sessions are ongoing and have been a key element in maintaining both writing momentum and community connection for our HDRs. Also instrumental in this has been the UC Repair Café, run by Monica Andrew and held every Wednesday during Semester 2.

There were also opportunities for HDRs to connect with research communities outside the CCCR. From 26-30 August, HDRs Ashley Harrison, Tessa Bell and Jessica Western took part in the Association of Critical Heritage Studies 2020: Futures conference, a fully virtual event hosted by UCL Institute of Archaeology, in the UK. The conference showcased multidisciplinary research on an international scale, and was an opportunity for Ashley, Tess and Jess to contextualise their work within a much larger research community.

In October, after submitting her PhD, Louise Curham was successful in obtaining an ongoing lecturer level B position in the School of Information Studies at Charles Sturt University. Louise will be teaching into the archives and audio-visual archiving courses. Charles Sturt has one of the oldest continuing library studies courses in Australia. Louise also received ArtsACT Homefront funding (\$6,700). The funding is for three projects: the People's Map of West Kambah, a 16mm solarisation 'diary' film and a project to create a digital performance tool for super 8 film projection.



In November, Liz Bellamy presented 'Escape from the Moskoe-strom: Disrupting the whirlpool of shame to restore connection' at the 25th Australasian Association of Writing Programs annual conference Rising Tides 2020. Liz's paper was highly commended in the AAWP Best scholarly student conference paper 2020 award. Kimberly Williams was also highly commended for her creative paper.

#### KIRSTEN KRAUTH

Almost a Mirror is a podcast about 80s song and music history to be streamed later in the year. The novel (and thesis) Almost a Mirror was produced at the University of Canberra under the supervision of Ross Gibson. It received the Parker Medal for Most Outstanding PhD thesis in 2019, the first time awarded to a creative writing thesis. The novel manuscript was also shortlisted for the Penguin Literary Prize and the book has recently been published by Transit Lounge. As the novel/thesis has been structured as a mixtape of 80s punk and pop songs, I am working with a number of musicians including Peter Fenton, Michael Simic (aka Mikelangelo)



and Richard Andrew to re-version twelve Australian songs, intermingled with my reading of the chapter, to create a new and innovative work.

#### TIM NAPPER


My Donald Horne project was called *Howling Metal: The Shape of Trauma in Vietnamese Noir*. The novel was an extension of the work I undertook in my creative writing PhD; specifically, a chapter on Vietnamese war literature called *Apocalypse Noir: An Impossible History*.

I completed two drafts of a novel titled *Howling Metal*, a science fiction noir set in Vietnam. In it I explore the nature of trauma, both through the impact on the characters, and through the structure of the novel. For the latter, the academic ideas of Jane Robinett and her work on the narrative shape of trauma (2007) were used. The literary exemplars of *Slaughterhouse-Five* (Kurt Vonnegut) and *The Sorrow of War* (Bao Ninh) – both analysed in my PhD – influenced the work more broadly. Finally, I drew on my personal experiences as an aid worker deployed throughout Southeast Asia.

#### **OLGA WALKER**

The Donald Horne Creative and Cultural Fellowship has allowed me to develop my Writing through overcrowded places into hollowed out spaces: Life after bushfire fighting project, which contributed to CCCR research pillars, Story, People, Place, and Arts and Health. My project connected to research in a number of areas, such as creative writing, mental and emotional health, women working in fire-fighting, and gender in emergency management organisations such as the RFS, the environment and how these might be impacted through possible outcomes from a number of reviews into the recent devastating bushfires. The project also acted as an expression of how volunteers can use creative arts in organisations like the RFS. Due to COVID-19, the project was unable to deliver seminars but with restrictions easing, there is hope that I will be able to organise seminars and workshops in 2021.
