ANME's Contribution to the Wunderkammer Exhibition

The ANME contributed a number of items to the recent Wunderkammer Exhibition curated by Alex Stalker-Booth, who is the manager of the University of Canberra's cultural and heritage collections. The nature of a Wunderkammer Exhibition consists of the collection and display of a diverse variety of culturally, scientifically and historically significant items. The concept has its origin in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries when English and European antiquarians

accumulated collections of scientific and cultural items of unusual and rare articles and objects of botanical, zoological, geological, historical, medical and artistic significance. The items selected for the University of Canberra's exhibition came from the various cultural and heritage collections located in the University's faculties. They included items from the geological and zoological collections held in the Science Faculty, children's books and original illustrations from the National Centre for Australian Children's Literature, botanical items and selections from the University's Art Collection. From the ANME, a variety of objects were displayed including an 1878 school needlework sampler, a 1908 Sporting Shield from ANME's Mowbray House archive and some early twentieth century writing antiques such as a slate, ink wells and pens. The Exhibition was mounted in the foyer of the Ann Harding Building and it was open for public viewing.

Distinguished Educational Researcher from Germany Visits

ANME Open Day

This year's University Open Day, on 31st August featured ANME's latest exhibition titled "Glimpses From the Past: Early Schooling in Australia." Display cases featured photographs of nineteenth century school buildings, including selected images of small rural one-teacher schools, very many of which were constructed in remote districts following the Colonial Education Acts of the 1870s and 1880s. Photographs of the distinctive "beehive" 1883 style of architecture are displayed along with solidly built brick schools which became more common from the 1890s.

The ANME display also included a selection of thirty Australian published histories of private and public schools in Australian states and territories.

Annual Visit by Teacher Education Students




