ANME Annual Historical Perspectives on Education Lecture, Celebrating 50 Years of the ACT Education System.

On the occasion, of the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the Interim ACT Schools Authority in Canberra in 1973, Professor Shirley Randell AO delivered an excellent account of the origins and development of the Canberra school system from early community initiatives through to its establishment in 1973 and progress to 2023 in her lecture titled, *Promises, Challenges and Progress: Fifty Years of the ACT Education System.* Professor Randell outlined the progressive stages in the evolution of this innovative school system

and she gave an interesting account of the role of parents, teachers, administrators and politicians involved in setting up the ACT Schools Authority. Randell placed significant emphasis upon the people involved, especially during the period 1970s to 1990s. Her lecture concluded with a Q and A featuring Professor Randell and Cheryl O'Connor, an Education Consultant and former NSW and ACT Schools Executive.

ANME/U.C. Open Day Exhibition. Acknowledging Excellence: Awards and Prizes from School Days.

The ANME has recently opened a new exhibition in the Heritage Gallery of Building 5, displaying a variety of documents and artefacts acknowledging academic and the talents sporting and achievements of school and college students from late nineteenth the century to the mid twentieth century.

Included are award certificates for academic success, such as Dux of School certificates, primary school Qualifying Certificates (QC), Intermediate and Leaving Certificates, Merit Certificates and musical attainment certificates. Sporting achievements are displayed for school sports, championship cups and trophies. A popular way of acknowledging excellence for school achievement was the awarding of Book Prizes most usually awarded as part of a school's formal Annual Prize Day. A student's achievement is usually recorded in a Prize bookplate pasted into the endpapers of the book. The use of bronze and silver medallion awards, containing the winners' names and achievements were common in certain schools.

Telopea Park School Celebrates its Centenary

On the weekend of 8-11 September, the Telopea Park School in Canberra celebrated its Centenary, 1923-2023. It was the first public school building to be built by the newly established Federal Government in the Australian Capital Territory. The Centenary Program of Events included a Reception held at Telopea Park School for past staff and invited guests; open day, school tours 9.00am – 4.00pm and a Community Picnic in the grounds of the School. To commemorate its rich history, the School partnered with the Canberra Museum and Gallery to create an

exhibition, displaying a fascinating collection of objects from the Telopea Park School archive. On 19 July, the Canberra Museum and Gallery also invited Ms Esther Davies, former teacher and now archivist and ANME's ACT Representative, to share the history of Telopea Park School. Past students and staff members were entertained with stories about how the school was built, the notable alumni – including Gough Whitlam – who attended the school, and the school's transition to a French-Australian bilingual school.

International Visitors

The ANME was host to a visit by members of the Women's International Club, Canberra Subgroup "Australia A-Z" coordinated by former school Principal, Lindy Ross, on 11th May. Many members of this group were the wives of diplomats from embassies and high commissions in Canberra. Following a welcome from the ANME Founder and Director Dr Malcolm Beazley AM, the group of 20 was conducted on a tour of the Museum's displays and repositories by ANME staff and volunteers. A fulsome morning tea was provided by ANME volunteers. Many of the visitors were most interested in display items, which compared and contrasted aspects of the history of schooling in their own countries. An indication of the visitors' great interest was reflected in the many questions they asked our tour guides in each of the three groups, which rotated around the ANME repositories.
