Second Community Heritage Grant

This year the ANME has received its second Community Heritage Grant, funded by the Australian Government through the National Library of Australia; the Ministry for the Arts; the National Archives of Australia: the National Film and Sound Archives and the National Museum of Australia.



In 2015 the ANME received a Significance Assessment grant to explain the meaning and value of the ANME collection which provides further information for its management and interpretation. This year, the ANME was successful again in being awarded a Community Heritage Grant. This is for a preservation needs assessment of the collection. These grants are highly competitive and reflect how highly regarded the ANME is in the community. The first grant (2015), was used to document the importance of the ANME collection as one of national significance. This year's grant will be used to prioritise the conservation needs of the collection, which will be invaluable when applying for further funding to support the museum's work.



It is with sadness that we record the recent death of a great supporter of ANME, one of our Patrons, Dr Geoffrey Swan, a Special Education expert from Queensland. Dr Swan had a most

distinguished record in the field of Special Education. He was a student at Queensland Teachers' College in 1944 and during the early years of his teaching career studied Special Education at the University of Oueensland under Professor Fred Schonell. the renowned authority in this field. He held the degrees of BEd, MEdAdmin, MEdStudies and PhD.

During 1960 Dr Swan became principal of the State School for Spastic Children at New Farm. In 1973 he was appointed Inspector of Schools in Special Education and in 1968 he was awarded a Churchill Fellowship to study the education of children with Cerebral Palsy, and in 1987 received the Medal of the Order of Australia for services to children with special needs. He was a Fellow of the Australian College of Educators and became the inaugural representative of ANME in Queensland.
