Final preparations are underway for the joint conference of the ANZHES and the ANME at the Inspire Centre, University of Canberra, from **24-27 September**. ANME will be hosting the event and participating. At least two ANME associates will be presenting papers.

Colin Dennett will outline his research on the Mowbray House School archive from the unique perspective of a former student of the 1950s. The archive is one of the jewels of the ANME Collection)

Dr John McIntyre will also be presenting his research on the archive of the Theatre for Children, Sydney (existed 1937-1957), focusing on the pioneering contribution of the theatre's founder, Rosemarie Benjamin. His uncle performed in the theatre.

Professor Geoffrey Riordan, Dean of the Faculty of ESTeM, will give the ANME Annual Lecture, as a keynote address on Sunday 24th September at 6.00pm. ## Launch of Occasional Paper

A new publication entitled Mowbray House Sydney: Reflections, will be launched at the Conference by distinguished Canberra identity Mr James Service, AO. Mr Service has had a long career in the property industry and has served in a range of capacities in public affairs and causes within the Canberra community.

Author, Colin Dennett, also a long time Canberra resident, is a former pupil from Mowbray House and has embarked on a case study of Mowbray House Boys' Preparatory School which was established in 1906 and closed in 1954. The entire Mowbray House archives were presented to ANME in 2014. Colin's chance re-connection with his first school via these archives has resulted in his study of the Headmaster's Reports over the first half of the 20th Century. Jim Service is also a former pupil of Mowbray House.

### Vale Alan Barcan

Dr Alan Barcan, the distinguished historian of Australian education, has died at the age of 95 in Newcastle. Though best known for his educational history, he engaged fully in political and sociological debates in education and its relationship to society.

HMC degree students, supervised by adjunct Dr John McIntyre, are developing precise descriptions of items for entry to the industry-stardard eHive database. The students are saying how much they appreciate this hands-on learning about museum practice.
