#### Twelve Key Findings on Deliberative Democracy

Published in *Daedalus's* Special Issue on the Prospects and Limits of Deliberative Democracy are twelve key findings in deliberative democracy research, put together by Nicole Curato, John Dryzek, Selen Ercan, Carolyn Hendriks and Simon Niemeyer.



#### Authoritarian Innovations in Rodrigo Duterte's Philippines?

Nicole Curato edited the *Duterte Reader: Critical Essays on Rodrigo Duterte's Early Presidency* (Cornell University Press / Ateneo de Manila University Press). This is the first book accounting for the rise of the Philippine's strongman. The book sold over 1,500 copies in two months and has been launched in twelve universities in the Philippines, Australia, United States, and Japan.



## Special Issue on Fragmentation and Complexity in International Climate Finance

Jonathan Pickering (with Carola Betzold and Jakob Skovgaard) edited a Special Issue entitled 'Managing Fragmentation and Complexity in the Emerging System of International Climate Finance.' Jonathan and his colleagues make a case for a systemic perspective on climate finance to foreground the causes and consequences of complex governance systems.

The articles are based on the workshop 'Climate Finance: Taking Stock, Future Directions for Policy Research' in Lund University. The Special Issue appears at the journal *International Environmental Agreements*.



### Grants

#### Exchange program with the University of Stuttgart

Since 2016, the Centre has been closely working with the University of Stuttgart's Institute for Social Sciences. Nicole Curato, Selen Ercan and Kei Nishiyama were visiting fellows at André Bächtiger's research unit in Germany, while André Bächtiger, Saskia Geyer, Eda Keremoglu-Waibler and Simona Zimmerman have visited Australia. Part of the exchange program is funded by the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD).



#### Moral Disagreements: Philosophical and Practical Implications

Selen Ercan and Lucy Parry co-convened a deliberative poll with Richard Rowland and David Killoren at the Australian Catholic University in Melbourne on August 19-20 as part of a joint research project on moral disagreements and deliberative democracy (funded by Australian Catholic University).

The two-day deliberative polling experiment focused on two morally divisive issues: i) the moral status of animals and the ethics of eating meat, and ii) the ethics of sacrificing the few to save the many. Over 200 people attended the deliberative experiment over two days. The research team used Q methodology to capture the participants' opinions and attitudes on the deliberated issues before and after the experiment.



#### Links with Yonsei University

A delegation from Yonsei Univeristy Law School, among others, visited our Centre to build partnerships across research networks.





#### Partnership with Democratic Innovations Unit, Goethe University Frankfurt

A new partnership with the Democratic Innovations Unit led by Prof Brigitte Geißel started this year. Selen Ercan visited this Unit to explore collaborative projects on democratic innovations.

#### Partnership with Berlin Science Centre (WZB)

The Centre has an ongoing partnership with WZB's Democracy and Democratisation Unit. Selen Ercan visited WZB this to plan workshops and other collaborative projects next year.

#### Partnership with Federal University of Minas Gerais, Brazil

Ricardo Mendonça visited the Centre early this year to speak at the Summer School and establish collaborative research projects. This visit is an outcome of the memorandum of understanding signed with the Federal University of Minas Gerais in 2015.
#### Earth System Governance (ESG)

The Centre has maintained its longstanding engagement with the ESG project, which is the world's largest research network of social scientists working on global environmental governance.

The Centre hosts Research Centre Australia for ESG, one of fifteen such centres around the world. Jonathan Pickering (lead author) and John Dryzek (contributing author) drafted a chapter on democracy and power for the new ESG Science Plan, which will inform the network's activities over the coming decade.

Jonathan co-convenes the ESG working group on ecological democracy, which led to an international research workshop at the University of Sydney. John continues to be a member of the ESG Scientific Steering Committee.
