With its specific focus on gender-related issues, the Graduate Certificate is critical for practitioners seeking to develop the analytical skills and practical knowledge necessary to create and implement gender-sensitive policies. The program covers a range of topics, including gender theory, policy analysis, approaches to communicating with diverse audiences and advocacy strategies. You will engage with contemporary case studies and participate in practical exercises that simulate real-world policy-making scenarios. This hands-on approach ensures that you are not only knowledgeable about gender issues but also equipped with the tools to effect meaningful change within your organisations and communities. You will gain the ability to critically assess existing policies, identify gender biases, and propose evidence-based solutions to promote gender equality. You will also learn to navigate the complexities of policy development and implementation, working collaboratively with stakeholders to advocate for inclusive and equitable policies.
