About this course

The Graduate Certificate in LGBTQIA+ Policy is designed for middle-level managers, community groups, and professionals in industries aiming to influence government policy, such as the Australian Public Service, local and state governments, NGOs, and the not-for-profit sector. With its specialisation on LGBTQIA+ issues, it is essential for practitioners seeking to develop the analytical skills and practical knowledge necessary to create and implement inclusive and equitable policies. The program covers a range of topics, including LGBTQIA+ theory, approaches to communicating with diverse audiences in addition to policy analysis, and advocacy strategies. The Graduate Certificate emphasises the importance of intersectionality, cultural competency, and community engagement in policy development to foster a deeper understanding of the complexities surrounding LGBTQIA+ issues. You will develop the tools to undertake meaningful change within organisations and communities more broadly, while also learning how to critically assess existing policies, identify biases against LGBTQIA+ individuals, and propose solutions that promote a greater level of inclusivity.
